

In this dynamic collaboration we also premiered Song-Gatherings; a new commission from local composer Eric Tuan.

FEATURED COMPOSERS

Our Journey to Spring reflects springtime's renewal and rebirth, its journey from the cold harshness of winter to the promise of sunlight and warmth. We start and end our program with two joyous salutes to spring and along the way encounter the mysterious incantations of "Urok" and the haunting shadows of death and war with our two commissions, Song-Gatherings and Ripple.

Song-Gatherings ruminates on the struggle between life and death; with acceptance but hope for eternal spring: "O Fire... you are the bright red image of fearful freedom...my body will be one with you...and mingle itself in your flame." Ripple gives us a topical reflection on the effects of a calamitous event on those involved. The piece reflects the disjointed upheaval of violence through text and music — a challenging journey in itself for our singers. The 'ripples' from Ripple began with our study of it. The piece stretches us as musicians and asks us to examine something very close to home for many of us.

We hope you enjoy this journey through darkness to light: from primal spells and incantations to the eternal promise of spring!

Ripple — Ted Hearne

Ted Hearne (born in 1982 in Chicago) is a composer, conductor and performer whose compositions range from operatic and orchestral works to rock and choral music. His *Katrina Ballads*, a modern-day oratorio on the media's take on Hurricane Katrina that uses a primary source libretto, was awarded the 2009 Gaudeamus International Composers Award from Music Center of the Netherlands, as well as one of the best classical albums of 2010 by *Time Out Chicago* and *The Washington Post*. Ted is the artistic director of Yes is a World and resident conductor of Red Light New Music.

"Ripple uses as its text just one sentence from one of the 400,000 internal military cables known as the Iraq War Logs... Ripple seeks to portray the effect of a singular trauma on the memory of someone who was involved. The single sentence describing the incident is set at the beginning and end of the piece – plainly, as if being read – but the rest of the movements focus on just one or two words at a time. Phrases reoccur and float in space, disembodied from the context of the larger sentence but nonetheless imbued with a memory or a feeling." — Ted Hearne

Spring Cantata — Vincent Persichetti

Born in Philadelphia in 1915, Vincent Persichetti began his musical life at the age of five, first studying piano, then organ, double bass, tuba, theory and composition. By the age of 11, he was paying for his own musical education and helping to support himself by performing professionally as an accompanist, radio staff pianist, orchestra member and church organist. Persichetti exhibited an affinity for poetry, setting numerous vocal and choral compositions to haiku as well as texts by Shakespeare, Milton, Wallace Stevens, Louis Untermeyer, and Conrad Aiken. American poet e. e. cummings provided a particularly rich source of inspiration for Persichetti, who composed six choral settings of cummings' poetry over the course of his career, encompassing twenty-three cummings poems in all.

The Spring Cantata, commissioned and premiered by the Wheelock College Choir in 1963, exhibits Persichetti's attention to cummings' idiosyncratic rhythm and tone. Four movements explore different aspects of spring: the delicacy of "trees," the breathless quickness of "if the green," the fragility of "Spring is like a perhaps hand," and the mercurial glee of "in Just-spring." Vocal and piano parts are equal players as they follow the abrupt, playful contours of cummings' texts.

Song-Gatherings — Eric Tuan

Eric Tuan (b. 1990) began his musical training under Robert Geary's direction with the Piedmont East Bay Children's Choir, and he is now a senior at Stanford studying music and linguistics. A voice student of Gregory Wait and conducting student of Stephen Sano, Eric has sung with the Stanford Chamber Chorale, the Monteverdi Consort, and Schola Cantorum of Oxford. On campus, he directs a compline choir and is an active collaborative pianist. Eric is also an emerging composer, with one of his works recently accepted for publication by E. C. Schirmer.

The poetry for *Song-Gatherings* is taken from the 1916 collection *Fruit-Gathering* by Bengali polymath Rabindranath Tagore, a poet, novelist, dramatist, and composer. Tagore translated the poems himself from his native Bengali into English.

Salut Printemps — Claude Debussy

"Salut Printemps," a joyful burst of greeting to springtime, is one of Claude Debussy's more harmonically traditional works. Originally entitled "Printemps," upon its publication in 1928 it was retitled Salut Printemps to distinguish it from the orchestral work of the same name. Flowing, arpeggiated vocal lines mimic the "rising sap" and coursing water of the lyrics, while athletic leaps in the piano part highlight the awakening of the world in springtime. A lyrical soprano solo celebrates the pure sensory beauty of the season before the opening phrase returns. This year marks the 150th anniversary of Debussy's birth.





DR. MARTÍN BENVENUTO

Artistic Director

Martín Benvenuto is one of the leading treble choir conductors in the San Francisco Bay Area and beyond. A native of Buenos Aires, Argentina, he has been Artistic Director of the Peninsula Women's Chorus (PWC) since 2003. Active as a clinician, panelist, and guest conductor, Benvenuto is also Artistic Director of WomenSing (WS), has served on the faculty of the Piedmont East Bay Children's Choir for eight years,

and has recently been appointed Artistic Director of the Contra Costa Children's Chorus.

Recognized for his exacting technique and a passion for drawing the finest choral tone, Benvenuto's repertoire is extensive. In addition to the historical repertoire, his choirs are dedicated to commissioning new works from composers such as Libby Larsen, Chen Yi, Stacy Garrop, Charles Griffin, Cristián Grases, Judith Shatin, Frank Ferko, Brian Holmes, and David Conte.

His choirs have earned high marks in international competitions in Argentina, South Africa, Canada, Hungary, and Spain. Of particular note are the third prize awarded to the PWC at the 2006 Béla Bártok International Choir Competition, one of the most prestigious in the European circuit, the 2010 Chorus America/ASCAP Alice Parker award, which recognized WomenSing for programming recently-composed music that expanded the mission of the chorus, and the PWC's second

place in the 2011 American Prize in Choral Performance, which recognizes and rewards the best recordings by choruses in the U.S. Benvenuto highly values artistic collaborations: his choirs have collaborated with Veljo Tormis, Joseph Jennings, Karmina Silec and Carmina Slovenica, Charles Bruffy, California Shakespeare Theater, the San Francisco Gay Men's Chorus, and the Golden Gate Men's Chorus.

Benvenuto has prepared choirs for organizations such as the San Francisco Opera, the Oakland East Bay Symphony, the Redwood Symphony, and the Kronos Quartet in works by Bach, Monteverdi, Britten, Mahler, Holst, Stravinsky, and Orff. Benvenuto also regularly appears as tenor soloist with leading Bay Area ensembles.

Benvenuto holds a D.M.A. in choral conducting from Boston University, where he studied with Ann Howard Jones and the late Robert Shaw. He earned his master's degree from Westminster Choir College, majoring both in Choral Conducting and Voice Performance and Pedagogy. His undergraduate degrees in choral conducting and composition are from the Universidad Católica Argentina.

JUNGMEE KIM

Accompanist



Jungmee Kim, a native of South Korea, earned her reputation in performing song recital repertoire while studying under several renowned and respected pianists and vocal coaches. Her mentors include Terry Decima, Irma Vallecillo, Susan Larson, and John Moriarty.

Jungmee was named Gideon Klein Scholar for her study of composer Viktor Ullmann and Jewish music in Teresienstadt Camp during the Holocaust. She also received first prize in the Performing Arts Society

Beethoven Sonata Competition and a Concord Pavilion Performing Arts Scholarship.

A highly sought-after musician, she keeps a busy performance schedule as a solo pianist, collaborative pianist, organist, and percussionist. She has appeared with the Boston Philharmonic Orchestra, Harvard University Wind Ensemble, Boston Opera Collaborative, Northeastern University Orchestra, Prism Opera, New England Conservatory Light Opera Company, Harvard Business Music Series, Longy School of Music, Bay Area Classical Harmonies, Oakland Opera Theatre, and Palo Alto Philharmonic Orchestra. Jungmee has also premiered numerous compositions by New England based composers.

Jungmee is the music director and répétiteur for the San Francisco Parlor Opera; recent projects include *Thaïs, Madame Butterfly, Così fan tutte, Agrippina, Follies, Le nozze di Figaro, Amahl and the Night Visitors, Hänsel und Gretel* and *Les contes d'Hoffmann.*

She has an M.M. from the New England Conservatory of Music; an M.L.A. from Harvard University; and a B.A. from Northeastern University.



PENINSULA WOMEN'S CHORUS

The Peninsula Women's Chorus, established in 1966, is a leader in the resurgence in women's choirs specializing in choral masterpieces. The PWC is known for

adventurous programming, seeking out music written specifically for women and frequently commissioning new works. The singers are se-

lected by audition and share an enthusiasm for challenging repertoire sung in original languages. Among PWC honors are second place in the American Prize for Choral Performance for its 2010 CD Nature Pictures; third prize in the 2006 Béla Bartók 22nd International Choir Competition, Women's Division, in Debrecen, Hungary; two Chorus America/ASCAP Awards for Adventurous Programming (2003 and 1999); finalist in the 2000 Margaret Hillis Award for Choral Excellence; and second prize at the 1994 Tallinn International Choral Competition in Estonia. The chorus has made three appearances at ACDA National Conventions - first in 1987, singing a feature concert of vocal orchestra music from the film Song of Survival, and presenting music for women's voices in a special interest session of music by Kirke Mechem; in 1993, presenting a traditional choral program; and in March of 2001, presenting a contemporary tour de force before more than 6,000 choral directors to great acclaim. In addition, the chorus performed as a continental founding choir at the AmericaFest World Festival of Women's Singing in Seattle in July 2001. The PWC has participated in many choral competitions and festivals: in 2011, it was selected to participate in the Seghizzi International Competition of Choral Singing in Gorizia, Italy; in the summer of 2003, it was one of four choirs representing the United States in Festival 500: Sharing the Voices, an international festival of choral music in St. John's, Newfoundland. In addition to extensive performances throughout the San Francisco Bay Area, the chorus has been heard on National Public Radio, and has appeared on television both nationally and internationally.






NATURE PICTURES

With its newest CD, *Nature Pictures*, the PWC celebrates a close relationship with prominent Estonian composer, Veljo Tormis. Influenced by his deep conviction that ancient song traditions reflect a close connection to nature, the prolific Tormis gives us the four seasons in 36 miniatures of intense choral imagery in his evocative song cycle, *Looduspildid (Nature Pictures)*. We are proud to present the first American recording of this cycle! This eclectic recording continues the theme with Karl Korte's Spring, Chen Yi's *Looking at the Sea* and Samuel Barber's *To Be Sung on the Water*. 
WINTER PATTERNS


EARTHTONES


CAROLS AND LULLABIES


